The project is to provide Post COVID support to Community groups and parish councils on projects to benefit their communities. The COVID-19 pandemic has brought with it a sharp increase in volunteers supporting the most vulnerable in society. Many enjoyed the chance to get involved and help others and with this a strong sense of community spirit became very apparent. To capture this energy, the Council was and still is keen to encourage volunteers to continue their good work with any projects considered beneficial for their local communities. This could include Community-Led Plans (CLP's), also known as Parish Plans which are a way to consult with local residents to find out exactly what is important to them and take those ideas forward through an Action Plan. To help parishes achieve their goals, the project has mapped out and identified key links within and between parishes and produced an online CLP toolkit containing downloadable templates and a bank of questions. Alongside this, quarterly workshops on a variety of community action themes have also begun which facilitate conversation to ensure information, innovative ideas, and best practice are shared. Good news stories are also publicised through a variety of media, showcasing the positive work that has been achieved..

Community Led Plans are a tried and tested, nationally known methodology for engagement within communities and prioritisation of community-led and identified activity. Research has involved conversations with parish councils, elected members and community groups as well as searching online to understand a little bit more about the demographics of each parish. Learning has also come from the COVID support groups helping the most vulnerable in our district during the pandemic. Needs have been identified, for example:

loneliness through self-isolation; digital exclusion issues which are more likely to affect the elderly in society; lack of sports groups for children and young people; facilities available for disabled people; setting up of food banks to help those suffering from poverty
